Lay down the law <b>SLANG</b>	To force a law or issue instructions strongly	The mayor <b>laid down the law</b> during the state of emergency.  The city hired the police chief to <b>lay down the law</b> .
Lead (someone) on	To trick someone romantically to get what you want	She <b>led him on</b> in order to get free drinks.  “Why do women always <b>lead me on?</b> ” He asked.
Left-click	To click the left button on your computer mouse; opposite of <b>right-click</b>	Please <b>left-click</b> and hit “save”.  Most people are right handed so we usually just say click instead of “ <b>left-click</b> ”.
Let (something) ride <b>SLANG</b>	To take no action; to keep something going as it is	I won \$10 gambling, I am going to <b>let it ride</b> to see if I can win \$20.  I probably should stop, but I keep just <b>letting it ride</b> because I feel lucky.
Make (oneself) at home	To feel comfortable in someone else’s house, as if it is like your own	Welcome! Please, <b>make yourself at home</b> . Sit down or help yourself to some drinks.  It’s polite to tell your guests to <b>make themselves at home</b> .
Mess with (someone) <b>SLANG</b>	To joke with or play with someone; similar to <b>fox with</b>	Stop <b>messing with</b> me and get serious!  It’s fun to <b>mess with</b> Julie.
Mosey on over <b>SLANG</b>	To walk or wander leisurely, while taking one’s time	I’m in no rush; I will <b>mosey on over</b> to your house later in the afternoon.
